SUSAN MCKAY

Susan McKay is an Irish journalist, feminist and author from Derry. Her work appears in the New Yorker, the New York Times, the London Review of Books, the Guardian and the Irish Times and she is well known as a commentator. She has won many awards for her work on social issues and Northern Irish politics and society. Her new book Northern Protestants - On Shifting Ground was published by Blackstaff Press in May this year. It has been both critically acclaimed and a best seller. The Irish Times called it "vital reading", the Dublin Review of Books called it "brave and brilliant" and the Observer said it was "fascinating and constantly thought provoking. Her other books include Bear In Mind These Dead' (Faber, 2007) which tells the story of the NI conflict through the voices of those bereaved. Susan was a founder of the Belfast Rape Crisis Centre in the 1980s, and ran the National Women's Council of Ireland from 2009-2012.

JAN CARSON

Jan Carson is a writer and community arts facilitator based in Belfast, Northern Ireland. She has a novel, *Malcolm Orange Disappears* and short story collection, *Children's Children*, (Liberties Press), two micro-fiction collections, *Postcard Stories* 1 and 2 (Emma Press) and a short story collection, The Last Resort (Doubleday). Her novel The Fire Starters (Doubleday) won the EU Prize for Literature for Ireland 2019, the Kitschies Prize for Speculative Fiction 2020 and was shortlisted for the Dalkey Book Prize 2020. Jan won the Harper's Bazaar short story competition in 2016 and has been shortlisted for the BBC National Story Prize and Sean O'Faolain Short Story Prize. She was the inaugural Irish Writers Centre Roaming Writer in Residence on the trains of Ireland in 2019 and the Open Book Scotland Writer in Lockdown during 2020. She is currently writer in residence on an AHRC-funded research project at Queen's University Belfast exploring the depiction of dementia in contemporary fiction and will be editing a collection of newly commissioned short stories exploring the dementia experience to be published in September 2022. Jan's third novel, The Raptures is

forthcoming from Doubleday in spring 2022.

WESLEY HUTCHINSON

Wesley Hutchinson is Professor Emeritus of Irish Studies (Sorbonne Nouvelle) and a former President of the Société Française d'Études Irlandaises (SO-FEIR). His research interests include unionist identity issues and cultural policy, especially as regards minority languages. His most recent book, Tracing the Ulster-Scots Imagination (2018), was published by Ulster University with support from the Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade Reconciliation Fund. He is currently working on a web project for the Ulster-Scots Agency entitled, "Making Northern Ireland."

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
